

Hello! Welcome to our list of plants that we recommend for shady landscapes! While not comprehensive, these are selections of some of our favorite plants for each category that we have this year.:

**Bug Bane 'Brunette'** *Cimicifuga simplex 'Brunette'*



This moist soil and shade loving perennial makes a statement! In late summer it produces tall white flower stocks that glow against the deep purple foliage and stems. If you have shade and moisture this plant is for you!!

**Pagoda Dogwood** *Cornus alternifolia*



This beautiful small tree is a native! It naturally lives in the understory of forests, so it is happy to get at least 4 hours of sun. It branches out in beautiful horizontal layers giving it a very majestic look! It is deep red fall color and produces small berries that are popular with birds!

**All That Glitters Viburnum** *Viburnum dentatum var. deamii*



This extremely adaptable low maintenance shrub is a great choice! It can handle most growing conditions, gets beautiful red fall color and produces purple berries that are popular with birds! This native selection is low maintenance and has a nice sharp appearance!

**Spreading Taunton Yew** *Taxus x media*



Yews are wonderful soft needled evergreens that prefer shade! They have a nice low horizontal growth habit making them a good border shrub in shaded spaces. They produce cute little red capsules with a small hard seed inside. The capsules glow off the deep dark green of the foliage!

**Mighty Chocolate Cherry Astilbe** *Astilbe chinensis 'Mighty Chocolate Cherry'*



Astilbes are wonderful perennials that, if given just a handful of hours of sun a day will flourish with bright flowers and textured foliage. Mighty Chocolate Cherry is as it sounds! It has dark maroon chocolatey foliage with huge fluffy cherry-colored flowers!

**Brilliance Autumn Fern** *Dryopteris erythrosora 'Brilliance'*



Who said ferns have to be boring??? When the Brilliance Autumn Fern grows new foliage they emerge a wonderful copper then as they mature they age to a dark green. Being a fern, it can thrive in even the deepest shade.
