

Welcome to our list of plants that can handle having wet feet! This is not a comprehensive list of everything we carry, rather, it is a selection of some of our favorites of what we carry this year:

Arctic Fire Dogwood *Cornus stolonifera* 'Farrow'



Dogwoods are extremely adaptable native plants that can handle a variety of levels of light and soil types (including wetter soils)! Dogwoods grow little white berries that birds enjoy. Also, the bright red stems are sure to be an eyecatcher in the winter!

Amber Jubilee Ninebark *Physocarpus opulifolius* 'JEFAM'



Ninebarks, aside from having eye catching foliage, are adaptable enough to be able to handle wet feet from time to time! They also produce little white blooms that are pretty popular with bees!

Blazing Star *Liatris spicata*



This beautiful native selection is the best! Blazing Star is able to handle wet feet and carry on happily! It is also very familiar to and a favorite of many insects. Not only that once the blooms fade goldfinches love to grip the dry flower spikes and munch on the seed!!

First Editions: Iceberg Alley Sageleaf Willow *Salix canadensis*



Like its relatives, this sageleaf willow loves having wet feet! This willow is very adaptable and while it loves wet feet it is able to handle drier spots with ease too! It has beautiful sage foliage and cute little pink catkins in the spring!

Blue Beech/Musclewood Tree *Carpinus caroliniana*



This native tree is very adaptable to most growing conditions. It is tolerant of occasional flooding and wet soils too! This tree gets a nice orange fall color. With unique and beautiful muscly-looking bark, This tree is definitely an underrated favorite of ours.

Bug Bane 'Brunette' *Cimicifuga simplex 'Brunette'*



This moist soil and shade loving perennial makes a statement! In late summer it produces tall white flower stocks that glow against the deep purple foliage and stems. If you have shade and moisture this plant is for you!!
